President's Points

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Greetings! Fall was a busy time for your MASEA board. In addition to conference planning, we have tackled a variety of issues including: tax exempt status for the organization; a MASEA list serve for members only; constitution changes; SEE training opportunities; and new member recruiting.

We are looking ahead to two conferences - first, the co-hosted conference with NSEA in Cincinnati in October and, second, the June, 2011, regional conference in Des Moines, Iowa. In September, Becky Wendt, MASEA Vice President for Professional Development, and I visited hotels in Des Moines, Iowa. Becky and I agreed that the West Des Moines Marriott offered our group the best conference package and the hotel had many benefits for attendees (i.e. free parking, free wireless in every room, flat panel HDTVs). The hotel is lovely and the rooms are very nice (\$99.00 per night). Please check out their website for more information: <http://www.marriott.com/hotels/travel/dsmwd-west-des-moines-marriott>.

I am pleased that MASEA will be hosting a conference in Iowa. We haven't had a conference in Iowa since 1978-79 (according to our history on the website) and the Des Moines area is very central in the Midwest region. The city is beautiful and the highway system is easy to navigate. We are hoping that more attendees will be able to attend because of the central location and the lower hotel costs. Des Moines is well within driving distance for conference attendees in Iowa and the surrounding 7 states.



In early October, the membership voted to go forward with obtaining tax-exempt status (501C3). MASEA has hired a recent law school graduate (one of my former student managers) to help us with this endeavor. **One of the documents that we need and are having difficulty finding is the original (or a copy of the original)**

MASEA constitution with signatures. If you were a member of the board at one time and have some MASEA archives, please look through them to see if you can find this document. We will not be able to proceed without it. Thank you!

In late October, the regional presidents and vice presidents met in Orlando (in conjunction with the NSEA conference) to discuss ways in which the regions can collaborate to enhance our organizations and member services. Some of the opportunities for working together include: webinars, federal issues, shared SEE trainers and training; application for federal grants; and, co-hosted conferences. This same group is in the process of creating and adopting a collaboration statement for the regions and NSEA.

In November, the MASEA board met for our annual board meeting at the site of the NSEA/MASEA co-hosted conference in Cincinnati - the Hyatt Regency in downtown Cincinnati. The MASEA board is very active in the planning and implementation of the conference and is looking forward to a large number of MASEA members attending the conference. The

hotel is located close to many restaurants, hotels and shopping: <http://www.cincinnati.hyatt.com/hyatt/hotels/index.jsp>. See the announcement in this newsletter and watch for more details in the next couple of months.

I am happy to announce that MASEA now has a list serve for members only. All members will be receiving an e-mail from our "list owner", Angie Mareck, with instructions on how to subscribe to the list. The board is hoping that this regional list serve will provide a valuable service for our members. It is a great way to network with other student employment professionals in our own region.

At one of our board meetings this year, the board compared our regional dues structure with the other regions and found that MASEA's dues are the lowest in the country. To keep more in line with the dues for other regions, the board agreed that we will ask the membership to vote on a dues increase from \$35 to \$50 for individual dues and from \$90 to \$125 for an institutional membership. The other rationale for the increase is to maintain lower priced conferences and to increase member services (i.e. conference speakers, low cost training opportunities). You can expect to get an e-mail within the next month asking you to vote on this proposal.

MASEA is hoping to have SEE training

in June and are hoping that one of our members will serve as a host for the training. If you are interested in serving as a host for SEE training, please contact Becky Wendt. Hosting SEE training is relatively easy – you would be responsible for reserving the rooms, ordering meals, and being the site host. (See Becky's article in this newsletter).

I wish you all an excellent semester. Please remember that MASEA is YOUR organization. I'm hoping that you will take advantage of the list serve to bring up issues and concerns regarding our profession. And, feel free to contact me or any member of the board with your questions or opinions.

Student Employee of the Year

It is time to start organizing the student employee of the year program on your campus. If you don't typically host a student employee of the year program at your institution, I encourage you to think about starting one. It is a great opportunity to recognize the exceptional student employees on your campus.

About the SEOTY program:

Each year, NSEA, in coordination with MASEA and the other regions, organizes the National Student Employee of the Year (SEOTY) program to give colleges and universities the opportunity to recognize the outstanding contributions and achievements of students who work while attending college. The process begins at the institutional level. Supervisors may nominate an outstanding employee for their institution's student employee of the year. Then, any institution who is a member of MASEA and/or NSEA may submit their student employee of the year for state, regional and national consideration.

Eligible Students:

All students employed through the

Student Employment Program of institutions with at least one member of MASEA and/or NSEA. This may include students working off campus in community service or tutoring programs at the institution's discretion. Resident Advisors, Graduate Assistants and Teaching Assistants are not eligible, unless they are employed through the Student Employment Program.

Students must have been employed for a minimum of 3 months full-time or 6 months part-time between July 1, 2009 and June 30, 2010 (anticipated).

Campus SEOTY winners are due to Angie Mareck, MASEA Secretary, by March 1st.

Selection Criteria

Students will be evaluated on the following qualities:

1. Reliability
2. Quality of Work
3. Initiative
4. Professionalism
5. Uniqueness of Contribution (*In*

case of a tie, uniqueness of contribution should be the deciding factor.)

Awards

- Each campus winner will receive a certificate and congratulatory letter from MASEA
- State winners will receive a certificate and check for \$75.00
- The MASEA regional winner will receive a plaque and a check for \$150.00
- The MASEA winner will be submitted for the NSEA Student Employee of the Year Program.

Purdue University Calumet

We have a banner that says “Celebrate Student Employees” that is hung in the lobby of the Student Union and Library Building. We send out flyers across campus to advertise the week’s activities with a note thanking students for their hard work! During the course of the year, we ask supervisors to send students to us who have been “spotted doing something outstanding” such as customer service. These students are sent a card stating “You have been spotted” with dog paws on it and are given a coupon for the cafeteria, Chartwells. If possible, I would like to do this during SEOTY. If budget permits, we can do it throughout the entire semester.

We play games from Monday – Thursday on the Concourse (lobby) of the Student Union and Library Building. On Wednesday, we have a DJ, pizza and celebration cake at lunch. On Thursday, we have a formal reception with celebration cake. This is when we give the SEOTY winner and runner ups a gift sack. The winner receives a plaque as does the winning supervisor. In the past, we gave the runners up some type of trophy too. On Thursday, we also select the winners of the games and give them their recognition gifts. These can be an actual item like PUC calendars, mugs, portfolio, etc. as well as coupons for Chartwells, our dining service.

This year, if budget allows, we will have some student employment give-a-ways but haven’t selected anything yet.

Western Michigan University

SEAW is fast approaching. It’s the acronym for Western’s Student Employment Appreciation Week. We use a two prong approach for our celebration. Not only do we celebrate and recognize our student employees, but we also recognize our supervisors. We’ve done this for the last 25 years. Good feelings are had by ALL.

Supervisors nominate students and students nominate supervisors – all online. Nominating online makes this process go better for nominating and judging. We usually have several hundred nominations per event. Anyone nominated is invited to our recognition event the Thursday of our celebration week which, by the way, always falls on Valentine’s week. What better way to show you care. It’s very purposeful that it’s done that way. At the recognition event, all nominees get a certificate from the VP of Student Affairs and then the “winners” of the Gary L. Belleville Student Employee of the Year (named after our first student employment director and one of the founders and ex-President of MASEA) and Supervisor of the Year are announced at the end. This event has steadily grown over the last 25 years to the extent we fill a large ballroom with guests, parents, nominees, VIPS and past winners. Mr. Belleville has come and told tales of student employment and handed out the award.

Before I get too far ahead of myself, prior to our celebration week, we provide each dept with enough signed certificates for each of their student employees to recognize their efforts. Plus we distribute around 1500 free gifts that we get from sponsors to provide to student employees. One final thing we give supervisors is an idea sheet of how to recognize the student employees in their department throughout the year.

With all this said, please contact me and I’ll let you know more specifics on how we facilitate this process. Celebrating student success is well worth the price.

Student's Effort Lays Groundwork for First Student Employment Week at Drury University

"You see, it doesn't matter what your major is. You are learning transferable skills in your on-campus jobs that you can take with you" says Tina Moore, Associate Director for the Career Center at Drury University. Her audience consists of roughly twenty student staff members who have been sent by their supervisors to learn how to use the job descriptions from their on-campus positions to construct their resumes when they enter the competitive labor market after graduation.

Tina scans the audience and spots Lindsay. She recognizes her as a student staff member from Human Resources. "Lindsay, what is your major?"

Lindsay replies with a grin, "Biology. I'm pre-med." There is a pause.

Tina thinks for a minute. "Do you work with health benefits information?"

"No. I do a lot of filing and reply to student employment applications" Lindsay says- almost sympathetically, as she realizes she's nearly got Tina stumped. There is another pause.

But Tina is a real pro. She's been doing this for years. She begins to rattle off a half dozen or so transferable skills Lindsay is refining daily in her position. "What about telephone skills, customer service, maintaining confidential records, maintaining a professional demeanor, written, verbal, and interpersonal communication skills, working with diverse groups of people to include internal and external applicants for staff positions, faculty, staff and student staff members and applicants to name a few?"

"Hmm." You could see the light-bulb go on. But it wasn't just in Lindsay's mind. I had an "ah-ha" moment, too.

It just so happened that I had decided to initiate Drury's first recognition of National Student Employment Week last year- though I had no budget. Lindsay had also happened to mention that she was soliciting gifts for a charity for her sorority and it clicked for me. I have no budget for NSEW activities, BUT I had a Lindsay who had always demonstrated tenacity in everything she approached who was good at soliciting donations. Brilliant!

Lindsay was charged with soliciting

donations and she did an incredible job in just four weeks! She raised over a thousand dollars worth of goods, services, and cash prizes that we were able to give away to our student employees. She collected coupons free games of bowling, gift certificates and gift cards to the cinema, restaurants and grocery stores, free movie rentals, sports memorabilia, tanning services, and Visa gift cards from a bank.

In addition to those other transferable skills, Lindsay can add that she has professional experience in soliciting gifts and employee recognition to her resume- skills that can be invaluable in a number of positions. Beyond the enhancement to her resume, she has enhanced the student employment program by building the foundation of this component for NSEW that will be enjoyed by student staff members for years to come.

What a tremendous honor it is to be a student employment administrator and be able to share stories like this with colleagues who equally passionate about the wonderful opportunities for students in student employment. Best wishes to all for a successful National Student Employment Week 2010!

Where shall the next Student Employment Essentials (SEE) Training be held?

When asked what drew members to join MASEA, the same goal is echoed over and over. That goal is to receive training to assist members in performing the duties of their job. MASEA offers its members and other student employment professionals a way to achieve this goal. It is to attend SEE Training.

SEE Training is a comprehensive and an in-depth instruction of regulations and practices for carrying out the daily duties of the job. Classroom style training is delivered by a team of well versed and knowledgeable trainers, and presented as two full day sessions. Participants may choose to attend Track A, Track B, or both. Each participant receives up to the minute information, a binder filled with material that can be used immediately, sample documents that can be tailored to individual institutions, great ideas gained through networking with peers, long-lasting professional relationships, and a certificate of completion. All this is available for the nominal cost of \$139 each track.

MASEA Constitution Changes

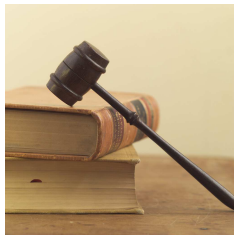

Economic woes at the national, state, and institutional level have provided many of us multiple challenges to face at our schools during 2009. Your MASEA board has faced some challenges over the past year (and more) as well. For quite some time we have been reviewing the Constitution of MASEA and have found multiple items that could use updating, including the term "Constitution".

MASEA is really governed by "By-laws" and that term should be reflected in the name instead of "Constitution". The Constitution was written over 30 years ago and has some articles that are somewhat irrelevant today, and other articles (when interpreted strictly as they are written) are quite limiting and pre-

vent the board from making and implementing some important decisions.

One of the limiting articles, **Article XIV: AMENDMENTS** can be viewed with the full constitution on the MASEA website at www.masea.org. The reason Article XIV is limiting is because #2 says: **This Constitution may be amended by the approval of two thirds of the voting membership.**



Unfortunately when the board has called for votes on amending the constitution in the past, we usually don't get two thirds of the membership to submit votes. That is why **ARTICLE XIII: VOTING** is so important. #1 says: **Each individual member shall be eligible to cast one vote**

on all matters pertaining to MASEA. The board wants to emphasize that MASEA is your organization, so it is very important to your organization to exercise your right to vote. It isn't important how you vote, just as long as enough of you vote to say "yes" or "no" to any proposals that the board or any members brings forward. The board hopes to bring forth some items for you to vote on in the near future, and we truly hope that you will take the time to vote. For MASEA to carry on as a viable organization in these challenging times, we need "you" the membership to be active in the organization. Voting is an easy way to do that. "Will Work for Beer" - My opinion By: Tim Putzier, MASEA President Elect

Salutations MASEA Members!

Happy new year wishes to all of you. Being an optimist, I look forward to seeing what the new year will bring us. In a small step at starting the year off well informed, I'd like to take this opportunity to share a couple of thought provoking articles, relevant to all of us in MASEA. I realize some of you may have already read these articles but for those who have not, they shouldn't be missed. Also, I think the articles could be a great starting point for discussions on the new MASEA list serve. I'll share a brief synopsis on the articles but because 1) I'm a firm believer in not plagiarizing and 2) I assume you would rather read the original articles vs. my interpolations, I'll provide you with direct links to the articles so you can peruse them at your own leisure.

The first article, while well written, was cleverly titled in such a way that it was highly likely to grab attention and garnish discussions on many college campuses. "Will Work for Beer" was an article published on the Inside Higher Education website, last October. The article summarized a new [study](#) from the Bureau of Labor Statistics that analyzed why students work, specifically regarding their earnings and parental contributions towards tuition costs and

resulting affects on G.P.A.. I admit, I certainly "fell for" the title. It caught my attention, I imbibed the article and for the most part, initially (more than I'd like to admit), I believed what I was reading. I took the article at face value versus using critical thinking and/or carefully evaluating the statements that I was reading.

Fortunately, not all readers of the article did the same. Within hours of being posted, readers were posting their own comments that questioned the "will work for beer" title and implications that came from using it. Interestingly, one of the strongest rebuttals was written from a Professor here at UW-Madison (disclaimer – I do not know her, wasn't paid by her etc., etc.) and subjectively speaking, I will say I was proud of her response. Bluntly speaking, I felt sheepish that I, at least initially, had so readily accepted the "will work for Beer" premise. I suspect I may have been projecting back on my own hours as a student employee.

The Professor, Sara Goldrick-Rab, had her rebuttal published in the opinion section of the Chronicle of



Higher Education, which I found ironic as it appeared to me she used more data and critical thinking vs. "opinion" to back her response, then the original "Will Work for Beer" article did. In her rebuttal article, she points out how the "Will Work for Beer" title

and resulting implications were actually not based on the data in the study but instead, a SUBJECTIVE assumption by the authors.

Of course, these are just my thoughts, my subjective opinions. I encourage you to take a few minutes to read both articles. Regardless of agreeing with or disagreeing with, I guarantee, you will find them interesting as both are based on solid data relevant to the work we do.
